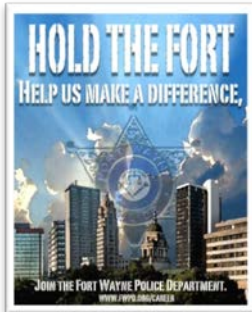

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MISSION STATEMENT

The Fort Wayne Police Department, in partnership with our community, will strive to protect the life, property, and personal liberties of all individuals. We believe that the overall quality of life for all residents will improve through the deterrence of criminal activity and an understanding of the diversity of cultures within this community. Furthermore, we recognize the need for fair and impartial enforcement of the law with attention given to the highest possible quality of service delivery to the community.

INTRODUCTION

The City of Fort Wayne is located in northeast Indiana, and is the second largest in the state. The City encompasses an area of about 110 square miles with a population of approximately 251,000 people. Fort Wayne's cultural climate is increasingly diverse. Fort Wayne's roots began in 1697, when the French and British built a series of three forts at the confluence of the St. Joseph River, St. Mary's River, and Maumee River near the Miami Indian village of Kekionga. The fort was built in 1794 and was named in honor of General "Mad" Anthony Wayne. Fort Wayne was platted in 1823 and experienced a rapid expansion after completion of the Wabash and Erie Canal. The proud tradition of the Fort Wayne Police Department began in 1829 with a single "Village Marshal". That tradition continues today with 450 sworn officers and 100 civilians and is led by Police Chief Garry Hamilton. The Fort Wayne Police Department is a full-service, highly sophisticated professional agency. Through innovative leadership and dedication to providing quality services, our Department maximizes its resources to provide a high quality work environment. We give our officers the same respect and concern that we expect them to show all citizens they come into contact with in the line of duty.



Police Chief, Garry A. Hamilton

Chief Hamilton completed his 1st year as Chief of Police. During his 20 years of service he has performed a variety of command positions and brings a wealth of knowledge and experience into his new role. Chief Hamilton began his career as a patrolman, then served 14 years as a detective in the Robbery and Homicide Division before being promoted to a sergeant. He later served in the Office of Internal Affairs. From there he went to the Southeast Division as captain, then to liaison officer for the Allen County Prosecutor's Office, and most recently serving as deputy chief over the City's Southeast Quadrant. Chief Hamilton's ongoing mission serving as Police Chief is to develop a strategic plan to address homicides and other crime activity; communication efforts with neighborhoods and businesses to address concerns of the public; utilization of technology; and a continued commitment to collaborate with the other law enforcement agencies that work with the Fort Wayne Police Department to reduce violence and solve crimes.

Chief Hamilton is assisted by Assistant Chief Steve Reed, Deputy Chief Karl Niblick of the Northwest Quadrant, Deputy Chief James Feasel of the Northeast Quadrant, Deputy Chief Steve Haffner of the Southwest Quadrant, Deputy Chief Derrick Westfield of the Southeast Quadrant, Deputy Chief Paul Shrawder of the Investigative Support Division, and Deputy Chief Martin Bender of Special Operations.



Public Safety Director, Russell "Rusty" P. York

Director York, having joined the Fort Wayne Police Department as a patrolman in 1975, retired as Chief of Police on December 31, 2013 after serving 14 years in this position. On January 1st, 2014, he was appointed Public Safety Director for the City of Fort Wayne. In his current position, Director York is responsible for overseeing the Police and Fire Departments, as well as Animal Care and Control and the Radio System Repair Facility. His priorities have been to ensure staffing levels in the police and fire departments meet the needs of the City, lead efforts to receive grant funding, mentor public safety employees, and provide direction and input on union negotiations.

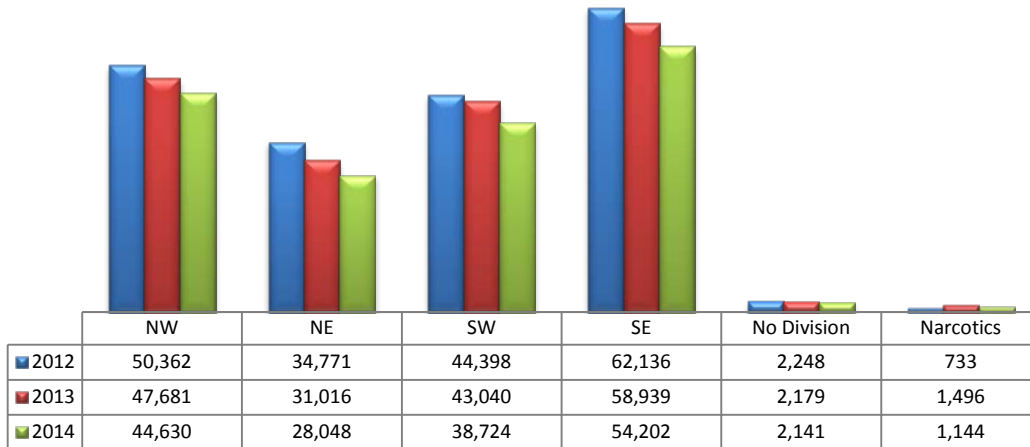

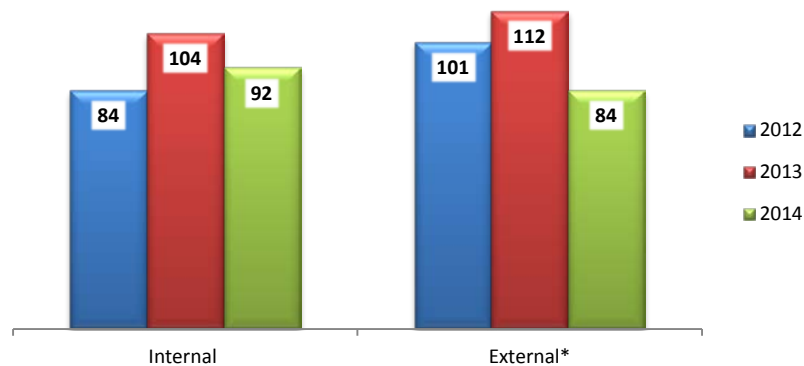
These dedicated men and women work tirelessly to keep the Department running from day to day, so that we may carry out our mission to service the people.

OFFICE OF PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

INTERNAL AFFAIRS:

The Office of Professional Standards, Internal Affairs Unit, saw an overall increase in activity during the 2014 calendar year. Captain David Nelson commanded the Unit. The workload was split between two investigators in the Unit. Additionally, the Unit Commander and Investigators, along with Administrative Assistant, coordinated, monitored and documented monthly drug tests. In all, 447 random drug screens were administered.

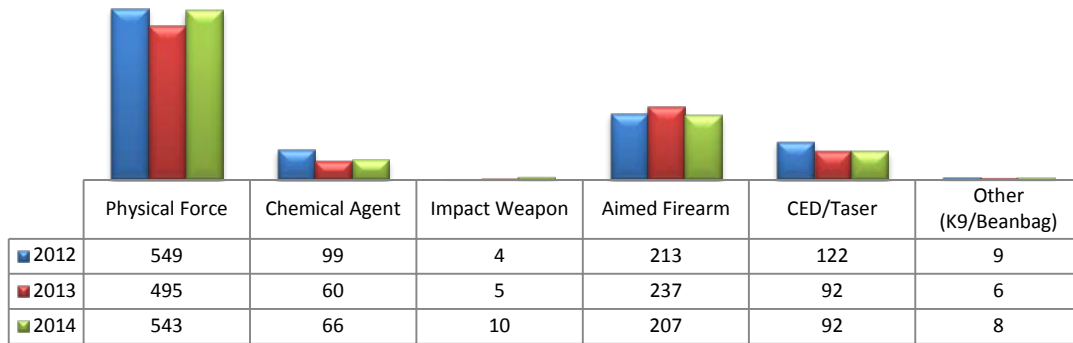
3-year Comparison of Formal Investigations



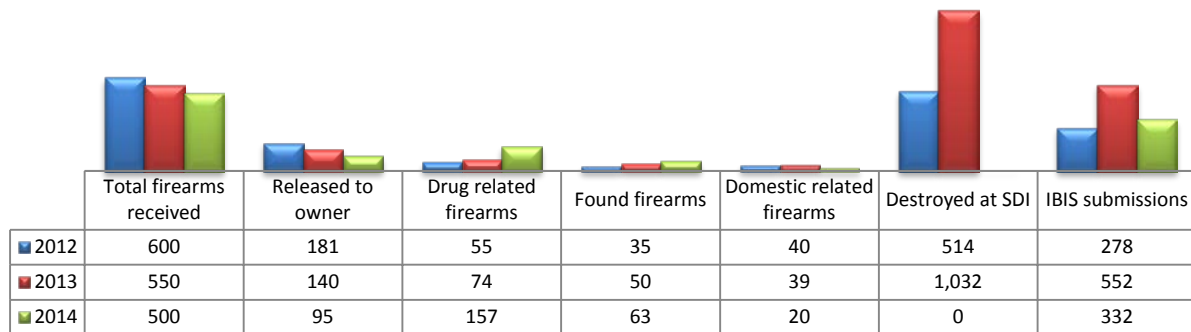

FIREARMS MANAGEMENT:



INFORMATION SYSTEMS & TECHNOLOGY UNIT (ISTU):

In 2014 the ISTU continued its core mission of maintaining the integrity of the Spillman system database and the maintenance of the Department’s fleet of in-car mobile data computers. During 2014 the ISTU spearheaded the upgrade of the Allen County/Fort Wayne Spillman system to version 6.3. This upgrade sets the table for implementation of updated GPS capability in 2015, namely the ability to determine an officer’s location via his/her handheld radio.

ISTU personnel were also charged with investigating the possibility of incorporating body-worn camera videos into the Department’s patrol operations. The ISTU identified early provider candidates and set up trials of these products. Part of preparing for these trials entailed upgrading the Department’s VeriPic digital photography storage and authentication system. ISTU personnel upgraded server and client software to allow for storage of video and added additional storage capacity.

Near the end of 2014, the ISTU identified AirWatch as a product that would greatly enhance its ability to repair, update, and configure software installed on the Department’s Mobile Data Computers. Installation of the new system began and full utilization is expected in 2015.

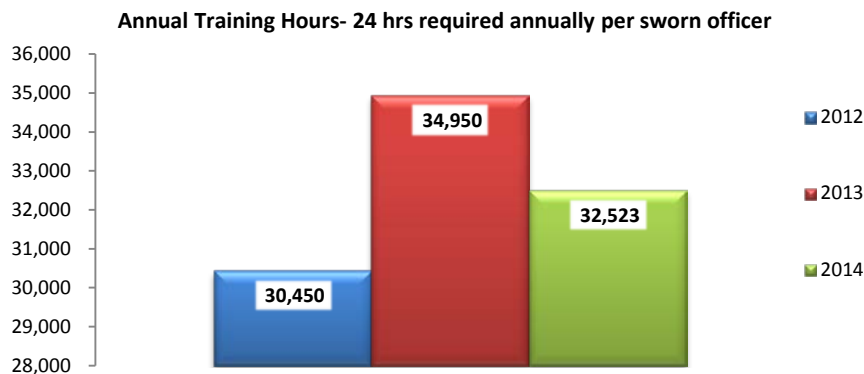


POLICE TRAINING CENTER

During 2014 the Police Training Center was commanded by Captain Shane Lee. The primary mission of the Fort Wayne Police Training Center is to facilitate:

- Hiring and training of new officers.
- Provide all active and reserve officers of the Fort Wayne Police Department the state-mandated minimum training hours.
- Facilitate training in specific topics.

The secondary mission is to provide/host any secondary training that officers need or could benefit from and maintain the training records for all sworn and reserve officers, which is submitted to the Indiana Law Enforcement Training Board (LETB).

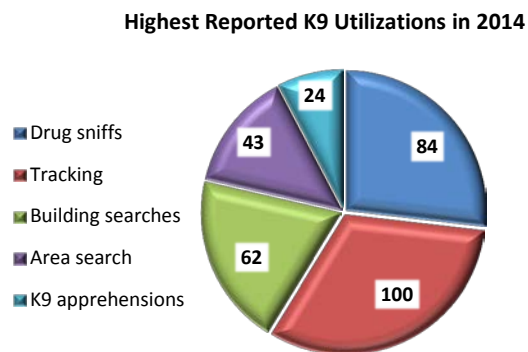
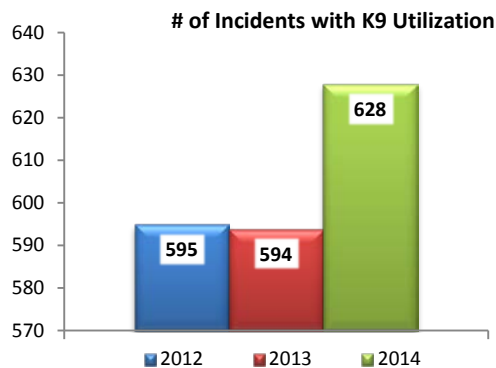

CANINE (K9) UNIT:

The K9 Unit continued to provide service to the department fulfilling its commitment to the Operations Division and Narcotics Division. In addition, the Unit fulfills requests for K9 demonstrations and lectures. The Unit also responds to requests for Cooperative K9 School Drug Interdiction Program between the Fort Wayne Police Department and Fort Wayne Community Schools. During 2014 one Patrol/Explosive Detection K9 was added to the K9 Unit and one Patrol/Narcotics Detection K9 was replaced due to age-related issues.

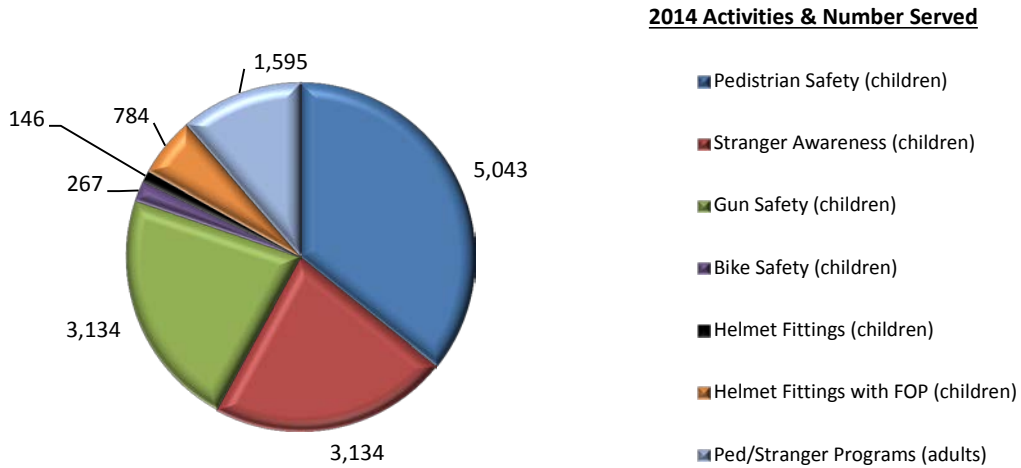

SAFETY EDUCATION BUREAU:



OFFICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION

The primary responsibility of this office is to promote the Department in the most positive and professional light. This is accomplished in a variety of ways:

- Through the accurate and timely release of police information and activities to the public by way of the media. The Office responds to hundreds of report requests monthly and releases information daily to print media, local television and radio stations, and internet media. The Office works very closely with the Investigative Support Division, the Crime Analysis Unit, and other divisions to identify topics that may be of concern to the public so that public service announcements can be generated.
 - In 2014 the Office constructed and distributed several public service announcements covering topics such as vehicle and residential break-ins, along with pedestrian and traffic safety.
- Department presentations and engaging the public at community events.
 - In 2014 the Department partnered with other law enforcement and first responder agencies in the 20th Annual Battle for Blood, collecting over 800 pints of blood and platelet products.
- Hosting building tours and facilitating ride-along requests. The Office recognizes the value that building tours and ride-alongs have in establishing community relationships. The Office frequently incorporates tours of the facility as a supplement to ride-along requests submitted by officers.
- Promoting safe habits by way of the In-School Safety Awareness Program. This program is in its 8th year of existence and continues to be a very successful program reaching thousands of elementary-aged school children to promote safe habits.



INVESTIGATIVE SUPPORT DIVISION



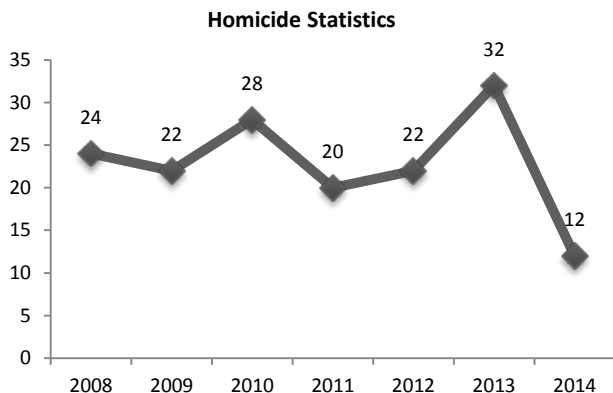

In 2014 the Investigative Support Division (ISD) was commanded by Deputy Chief Paul Shrawder and Captain Deborah Joyner. The ISD is responsible for the felony investigative function of the Fort Wayne Police Department. Most of the sections are focused on specific or specialized areas of investigating criminal acts or support functions thereof. When citizens call the police to report felony criminal acts the usual response that comes to mind or is depicted in media coverage is the very visible response of marked police cars, lights, sirens, and uniformed officers. While the initial response is a major and necessary function of a police department within a community, it is the aftermath or follow-up stages of investigating an incident that, while not so visible, is a vital function of police services. The sections and units within ISD include: Detective Bureau, Vice and Narcotics Bureau, Crime Scene, Crime Lab, Property Room, Victim’s Assistance, and Crime Analysis. The over one hundred sworn police officers and civilian support staff assigned to the Investigate Support Division are committed to providing services to the citizens of Fort Wayne, bringing criminal suspects to trial and obtaining justice for victims of crime.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

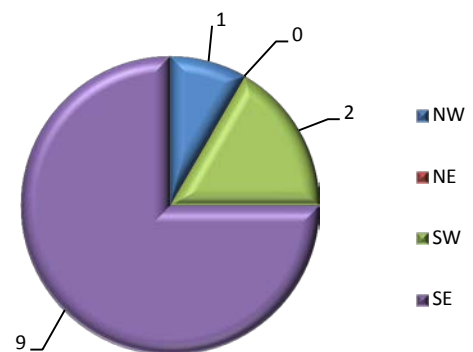
This Unit consists of sworn personnel who investigate felony incidents that occur within the City of Fort Wayne and may on occasion be asked to assist outside agencies with their investigations. Sections of the Detective Bureau include: Robbery, Homicide, Crimes Against Persons (Sex Crimes), Property Crimes, Financial Crimes, Domestic Violence Unit, Juvenile Crimes Unit, B-Shift and C-Shift Detectives.

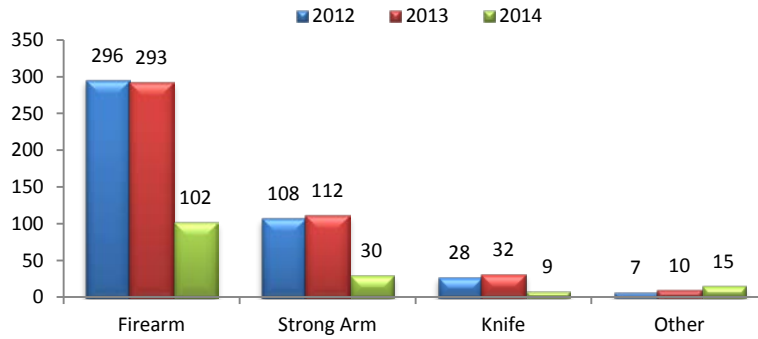

2014 Homicide Breakdown by Quadrants

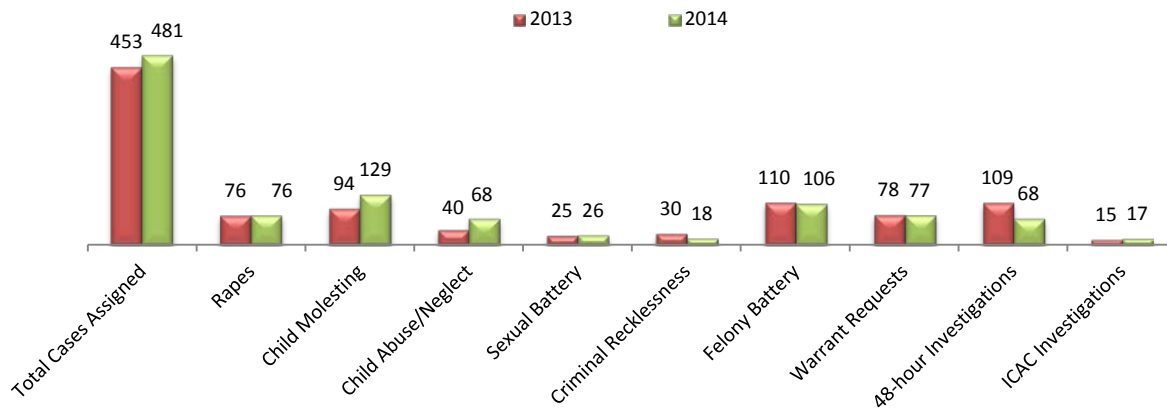




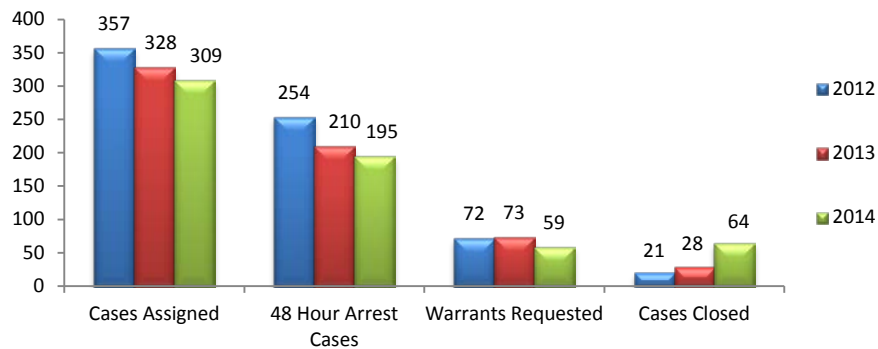

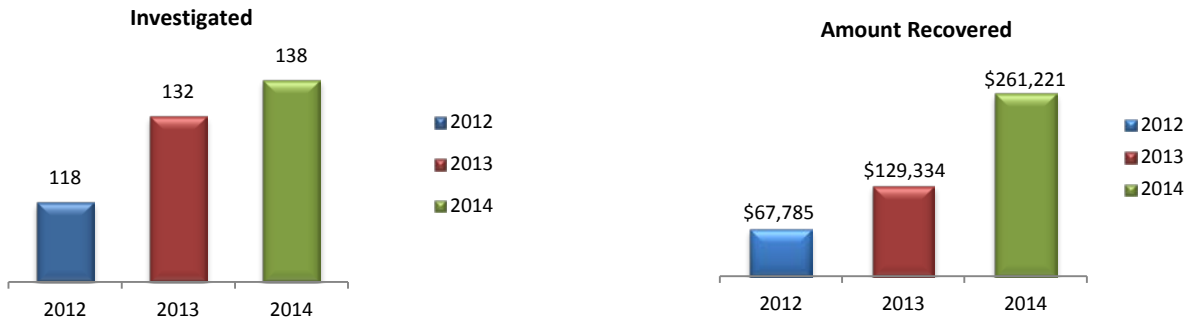
AUTO-THEFT UNIT:

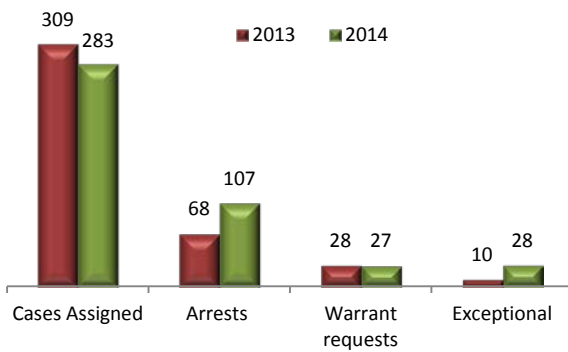




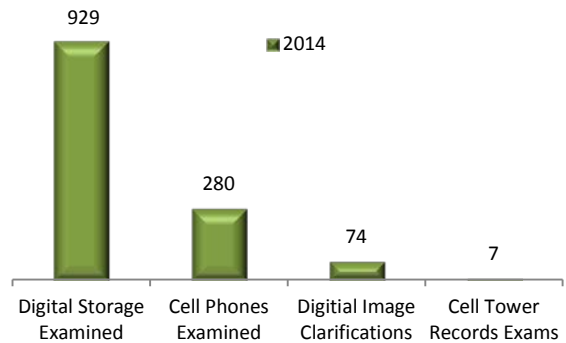

Ten detectives actually work on-going investigations and the eleventh detective is assigned full-time to the Forensic Data Recovery Section.

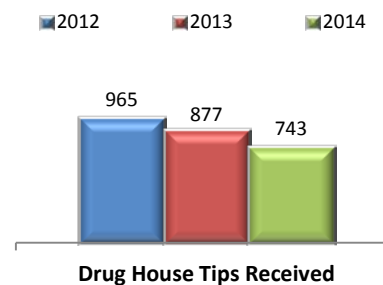
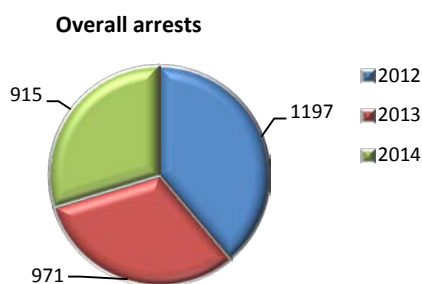
VICE AND NARCOTICS BUREAU

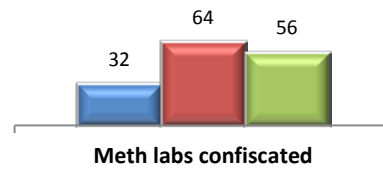
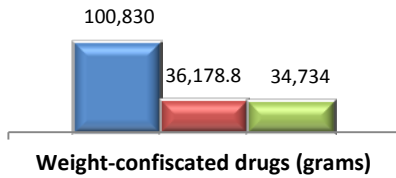
The Vice and Narcotics Bureau is committed to enhancing the quality of life in Fort Wayne through investigation of narcotics-related activities. The commitment is facilitated by creating an open dialogue with the internal and external stakeholders of the Fort Wayne Police Department by understanding their needs and directing our resources and efforts accordingly. In 2014 the Bureau focused on three areas of enforcement:

- Partnership with the federal law enforcement agencies
- Gang and violent crime activity

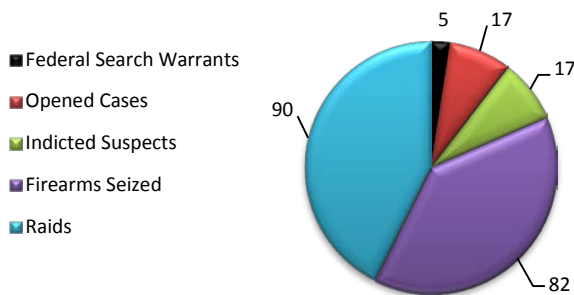

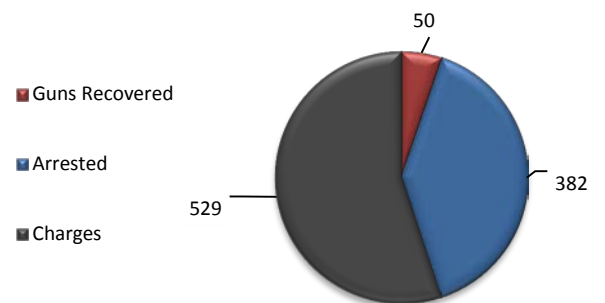




ATF-TASK FORCE - 2014

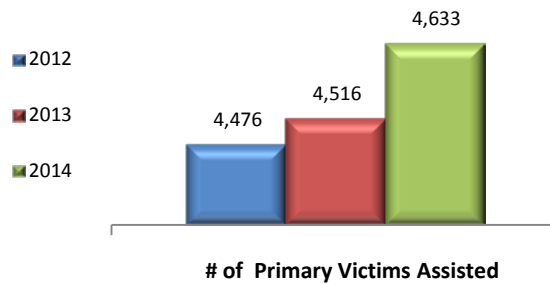


VICTIM'S ASSISTANCE SERVICES

The Victim's Assistance program provides comprehensive crime victim services to the City of Fort Wayne and surrounding communities. Ten advocates and five volunteers passionately work to provide information to crime victims to reduce re-victimization as victims navigate through the criminal justice system. Primary and secondary crime victims receive direct services to help stabilize their lives and meet their immediate needs. The outreach program initiates contact to inform victims about available services and their rights as crime victims and survivors. Victim's Assistance collaborates with a number of community and state agencies to provide training, community events and projects developed to address the emotional, physical, financial, social, spiritual, and cultural needs of crime victims.

- Domestic
- Sexual Assault
- DUI (Death or Injury)
- Robbery
- Assault
- Other (includes suicide, threats, staling, arson, fraud, property, elder abuse, etc.)

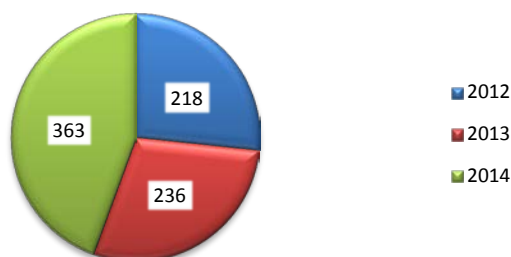


LABORATORY SERVICES

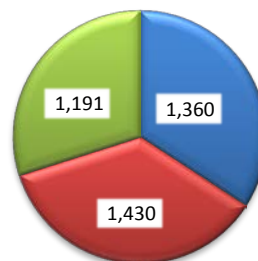
The Fort Wayne Police Department Laboratory (FWPL) is maintained by three civilian employees. The Unit is responsible for conducting forensic examinations on evidence collected and submitted from various crime scenes including, but not limited to: latent fingerprint and palm print evidence, footwear, tire/track, postmortem fingerprints and other physical comparison for the purpose of supporting the Department in criminal investigations. In addition, the unit oversees officer/civilian training in various forensic disciplines and is responsible for operation, training & maintenance of the county-wide Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS).

The year 2014 marked the end of an era for the FWPL. Retired Lieutenant David Young, the Laboratory Manager/AFIS Manager, retired after nearly 40 years of service to the Fort Wayne Police Department. Under his leadership the Automated Fingerprint Identification System (ADIS) became a reality for the Laboratory in 2002. In September Eric Black, retired sergeant for the Fort Wayne Police Department and current staff member of FWPL, was chosen to become the new Laboratory Manager.

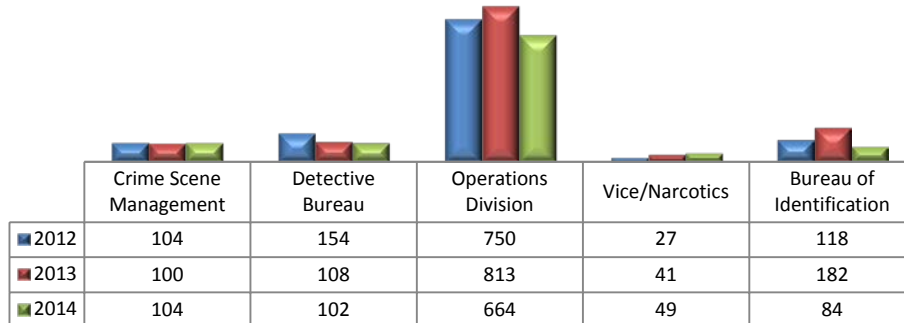

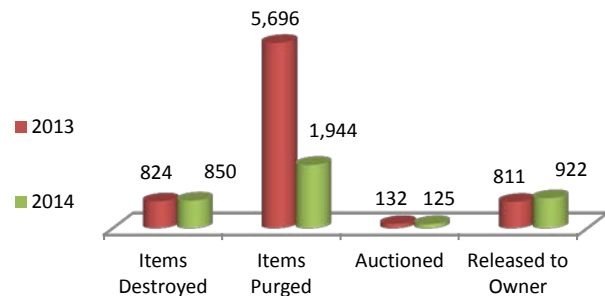
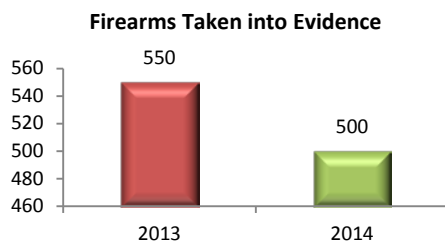

EVIDENCE/PROPERTY ROOM

This Unit is responsible for ensuring evidence collected and turned in is in accordance with the Fort Wayne Police Department's policies. It is the mission of the Unit to maintain integrity of all evidence and to ensure the proper handling and storage which will assist in successful prosecution and returning property to its rightful owner.

CRIME ANALYSIS UNIT

The general functions of the Unit include:

- Review crime reports, detect crime patterns, and provide proactive information to the Investigative Support Division (ISD) and to the Operations Division (locations, suspects and statistical data).
- Effect quality control issues regarding the Spillman data sets.

The Unit reads all felony reports for data accuracy and forwards all crime patterns and trends, crime maps and other related information to the ISD Section Commander and/or to the Operations Command staff, Street Crimes Unit, Violent Crime and Gang Unit, and the Public Information Office. The statistical information is then compiled and forwarded to the FBI-URC. Additionally, the Unit provides yearly crime data to the local colleges and universities so they can meet their Federal Government Requirements (Clery Act). In 2014 the Unit began electronically reporting monthly FBI-URC statistics. This new electronic format utilizes a spreadsheet designed and distributed by the FBI. Additionally, Crime Analysis staff also began participating in bi-monthly Spillman Board meetings and attended a two-day Indiana Spillman User Conference held in Frankfort, Indiana.



CRIME STOPPERS



Crime Stoppers is a non-profit community program geared towards public involvement in the fight against crime. It offers cash rewards and anonymity to citizens who provide information. The program covers (11) Indiana counties (Allen, Adams, Wells, Wabash, Grant, Whitley, Lagrange, Huntington, DeKalb, Noble and Steuben) and has a Board of Directors composed of citizens from all areas of the community who oversee the operation of the program and approves the rewards to be paid. Crime Stoppers has been serving Fort Wayne and Allen County for just over 30 years. In 2014 Crime Stopper's paid out over \$16,700 in reward money.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

In 2014 Deputy Chief Martin Bender was appointed to oversee the newly formed Special Operations Division. The Division consists of the Fort Wayne/Allen County Crash Team (FACT), Hit/Skip Section, Traffic Safety Grants, Emergency Services Team (EST), Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), Crisis Response Team (CRT) and the Hazardous Devices Unit.

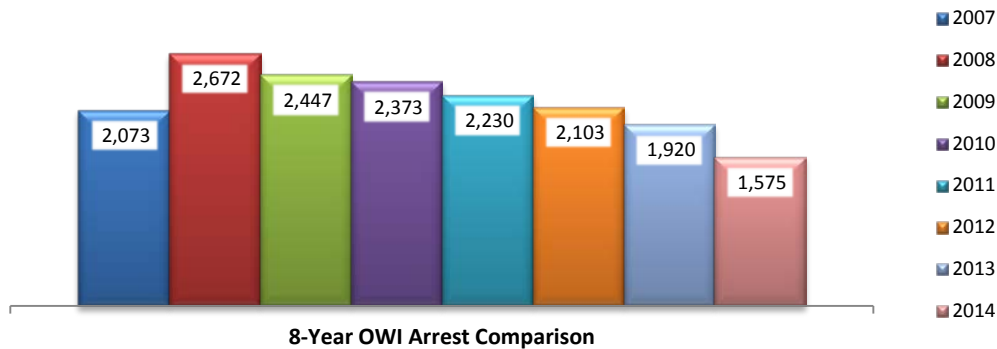
TRAFFIC OVERVIEW

Lt. Tony Maze is the Traffic Grant Coordinator for the Fort Wayne Police Department and the Coordinator for the Fatal Accident Crash Team (FACT). He oversees the acquisition of traffic safety grants, their administration, and day-to-day coordination of the FACT team. Additionally, Lt. Maze oversees the Allen County Traffic Safety Partnership, which was formed in the spring of 2009.

In 2014 there were 937 people tested at "B-90" in the Allen County Confinement Center, the central location for the BAC DATAMASTER. This number is down from 1,098 in 2013. The average Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) of those drivers arrested in Fort Wayne or Operating While Intoxicated (OWI) is .151% which is .011% higher than the average result in 2013.





FORT WAYNE/ALLEN COUNTY CRASH TEAM (FACT)

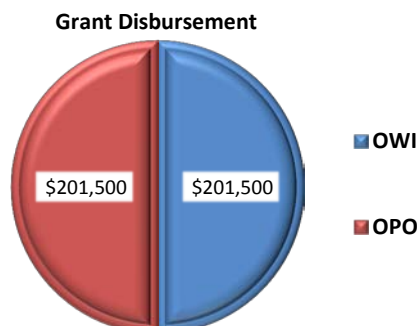
FACT was established in June 2006. The Unit consists of officers from the Fort Wayne, Allen County, and New Haven Police Departments; five teams with five officers on each team. These officers (who volunteer to serve on this team) are specifically trained to investigate serious injury and fatal crashes throughout Allen County. Grant assistance is obtained from the Governor’s Council on Impaired & Dangerous Driving. In 2014 FACT responded to 32 serious bodily injury or fatal crashes in Fort Wayne, which was up from 30 in 2013. Of those, 17 were fatal crashes and 18 deaths as a result of those crashes. These numbers are also up from 2013 where there were 12 crashes with 13 deaths. Alcohol or drugs were a contributing factor in 12 of the 32 crash investigations.

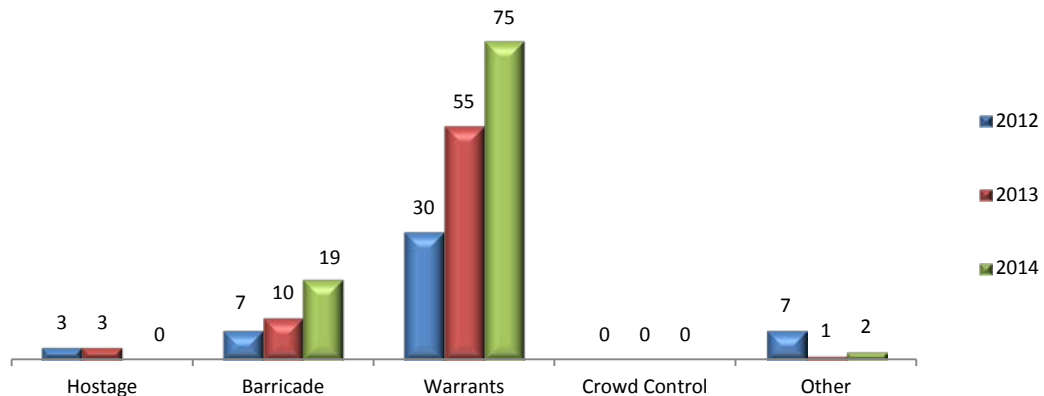

EMERGENCY SERVICES TEAM (EST)



The EST exists to provide the City with the ability to successfully resolve extraordinary and volatile incidents, with as little loss of life and property as possible. Some of the situations responded to include: hostage situations, sniper situations, barricaded/suicidal subjects, high-risk warrant service, and high-risk stakeout details. In 2014 the EST responded to (96) callouts which included 0 hostage situations, 19 barricaded suspects, 75 high risk warrant services, 0 crowd control details and 2 dignitary protection details for the State Republican Party Convention. Of those high risk warrant services, 56 were for drug houses (Vice & Narcotics), 8 for the Detective Bureau in reference to various violent felony cases, and 2 federal warrants for the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA). Of the 56 warrants for Vice & Narcotics, 15 were methamphetamine labs. This represents a 34% increase in operations over 2013 and is the highest number of operations in the last 9 years.



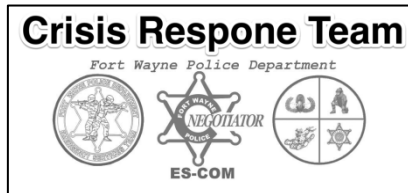

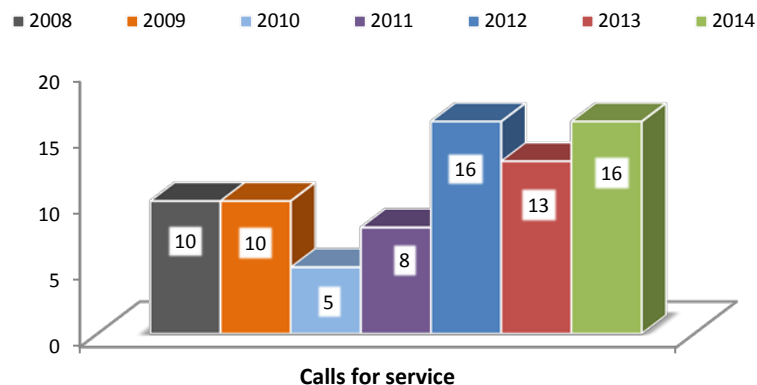
CRISIS RESPONSE TEAM (CRT)



The CRT was formed to respond to hostage, barricade situations, or suicidal incidents, which might require the use of negotiators. The ultimate goal of the CRT is to peacefully resolve all calls that they respond to, minimizing injury to officers, victims and suspects involved. The Team consists of 13 law enforcement personnel from both FWPD and the local FBI office. As a specialty team under the organizational authority of the FWPD Special Operations Deputy Chief, it provides crisis negotiations support in close coordination with the Department's Emergency

Services Team (EST) under the scene authority of the designated Incident Scene Commander during a critical event involving barricaded suspect(s) and/or hostage-takers.

The CRT experienced a change in leadership and added personnel during 2014 that resulted in both greater team diversity and career experience, along with the team's first member from another agency. The Unit continues to excel professionally with a high degree of career competency and experience amongst its individual members and as a negotiation team.





HAZARDOUS DEVICES UNIT



Hazardous Devices Unit

The Hazardous Devices Unit consists of 5 members and is responsible for responding to 11 counties in Northeast Indiana. In 2014 the Unit responded to 110 calls to service. During the year the Unit was invited to attend the Radiological Dispersal Device and Improvised Nuclear Device training with the Stabilization Team. This team is based out of Indianapolis and was formed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Additionally, in 2014 the Unit taught at one of the Department's in-services and closely trained with the ATF, FBI, Indiana State Police, Indianapolis Metro Bomb Squad, National Assets Team, United States Army and Navy Special Operations teams.



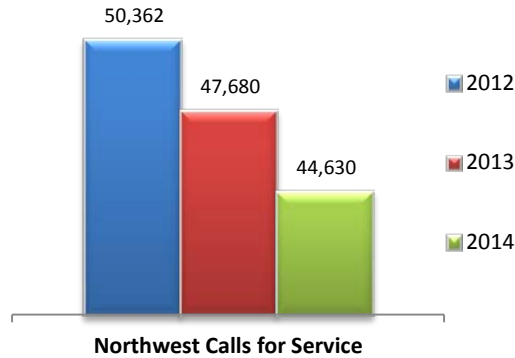


NORTHWEST DIVISION

In 2014 the Northwest Division was commanded by Deputy Chief Karl Niblick and Captain Paul Smith. The Division provides police service to approximately 68,032 citizens. Northwest officers are responsible for covering 34.5 square miles of the City's total 110.36 miles. In 2014 the Northwest Division had 44,630 calls for service and posted a 6.88% overall crime reduction from 2013. In particular, larcenies, burglaries, and robberies were down from 2013. One goal during 2014 was to move in the direction of a paperless office. The Division introduced the Formatta program to the Department. In doing so, the Department was able to replace hardcopies of vacation requests, exchange of duty, overtime, and job bids. The program will streamline the submission process, reduce departmental printing costs, and save fuel (since the program is automated there is no longer the need to submit a hardcopy to Command staff). The Division consists of Northwest Operations and Operation's Command of the Northwest Division.

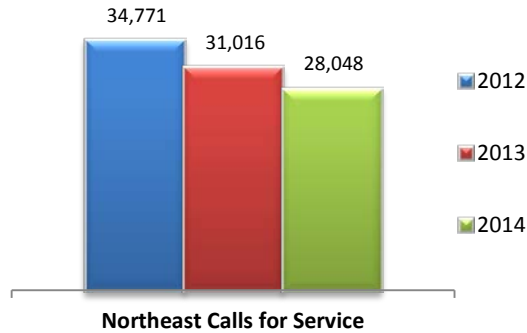


NORTHEAST DIVISION

In 2014 the Northeast Division was commanded by Deputy Chief James Feasel and Captain Tim Bogenschutz. The Division provides police service to approximately 75,934 citizens. Northeast officers are responsible for covering 30 square miles of the City's total 110.36 miles. In 2014 the Northeast Division had 28,048 calls for service compared to 31,016 in 2013. This was a decrease of 9.6%, which allowed the officers to be more proactive. Two of the major focuses for the year were in the areas of Larceny and Burglary. Larcenies went down from 1,265 in 2013 to 1,077 in 2014. This was a decrease of 14.9%. Burglaries also went down from 397 in 2013 to 246 in 2014. This is a decrease of 38%. In spite of the current economic challenges, the Northeast Division continues to maintain the lowest number of reported crimes and largest decrease in crime of any other division with the City of Fort Wayne. The Division consists of Northeast Operations, Pipe and Drum Brigade, Police Athletic League (PAL), and the Honor Guard.

PIPE AND DRUM BRIGADE

The Pipe and Drum Brigade served our community and beyond during the 2014 season completing a total of 14 commitments ending its 10th year serving the Fort Wayne Police Department. Since its inception in 2004, the Brigade has gone through many developments. In the beginning the Brigade relied on other bands to supply numbers. At present the Brigade has grown to 13 members consisting of 8 pipers and 5 drummers. The bagpipers practice every week in an attempt to learn new music and improve their quality of play. Through the generous donations from the Patrolman's Benevolent Association and the Fraternal Order of Police Indiana Wayne Lodge #14, all of the new pipers have been uniformed. Donations received from the community have also allowed the Brigade to remain self-sufficient.

The Brigade was called upon to serve the community in several events that include retired officers funerals, line of duty deaths, state and local memorials, political conventions, fire and police department graduations, awards ceremonies and Veterans' Day ceremonies. In addition to these types of events, pipers and drummers are called individually to assist with weddings, anniversaries, funerals and other family functions throughout the community. We have maintained a partnership with the Fort Wayne Fire Department Pipes & Drums forming a brotherhood that has evolved into a massed band for several events. The two bands rely on each other to fill voids that may occur when events arise, allowing members to play at different skill levels and increase opportunities to perform.

HONOR GUARD

The year 2014 was an extremely active year for the entire team. Between the regularly scheduled training, parades, and special events, combined with funeral details of both active and retired officers from the Department, as well as other agencies, the Unit was called upon to perform its duties on a regular basis. There were 27 commitments completed, which consisted of 126 assignments. The Unit's professionalism and dedication has not gone without notice. On a continuous basis, the Honor Guard receives positive comments from the community, other agencies, and retired officers from the Department.

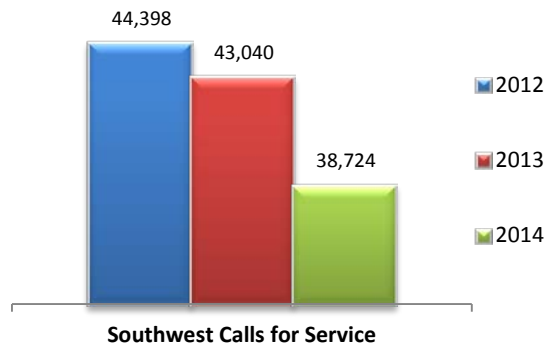

In 2014 the Southwest Division was commanded by Deputy Chief Steve Haffner and Captain Scott Berning. The Division provides police service to approximately 63,155 citizens. Southwest officers are responsible for covering 35 square miles of the City's total 110.36 miles. In 2014 the Southwest Division had 38,724 calls for service compared to 43,040 in 2013. This was a decrease of 8.9%, which allowed the officers to be more proactive. During the year the downtown police beat was expanded to run from April through November. Officers concentrated their efforts on the downtown pedestrian traffic and Fort Wayne trails. Officers were asked to lead several "Trek the Trail" nights put on by Fort Wayne Trails. Bike officers have handled over 361 investigations since its tenure. The program also increased its size in 2014 when an additional 15 officers were certified as bike officers. The Division consists of Southwest Operations, the Hispanic/Multicultural Liaison Officer, and the Reserves Program

HISPANIC/MULTICULTURAL LIAISON OFFICER

The Department maintains an office dedicated to the sensitive issues and concerns with emerging populations in regard to public safety. Officer Ric Robles serves as the FWPD's Liaison Officer. He brings together nationally recognized service providers, serves on numerous boards, and provides essential information to emerging communities in our area. Officer Robles participates in initiatives to help build positive relationships between multicultural communities and police. In 2014 Officer Robles was tasked with the addressing growing homelessness in our community and will continue to concentrate his efforts on this topic in 2015.

RESERVE PROGRAM

The Fort Wayne Police Department Reserve Program continues to supplement sworn officers and staff special events at no cost to the citizens of Fort Wayne. The program currently has 8 reserve officers, who are dedicated to the Department and their training needs. During the year the Reserves were put through many tactical phases of firearms proficiency to include shotgun/handgun transition and patrol rifle, with low light/no light maneuvers. Other training included room clearing, active shooter scenarios, domestic violence scenarios, human trafficking, hazmat, adult protective services, mental health, and Emergency Vehicle Operators Course (EVOC) through the use of classroom and practical exercises. In 2014 the decision was made to discontinue the program through attrition. This decision was due to training time, budget constraints and because the Department will be fully staffed in 2015.

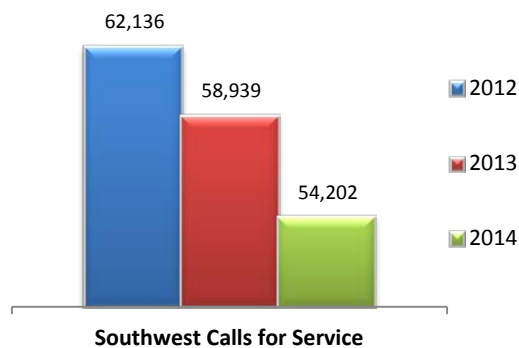

In 2014 the Southeast Division was commanded by Deputy Chief Derrick Westfield and Captain William Corn. The Division is staffed with 72 officers and provides police service to approximately 52,189 citizens. Southeast officers are responsible for covering 17.5 square miles of the City's total 110.36 miles. In 2014 the Southeast Division had 54,202 calls for service compared to 58,939 in 2013. This was a decrease of 9%. Overall the Southeast Division receives more calls for service than the other quadrants in the City and in 2014 received 32% of the total police calls for service.

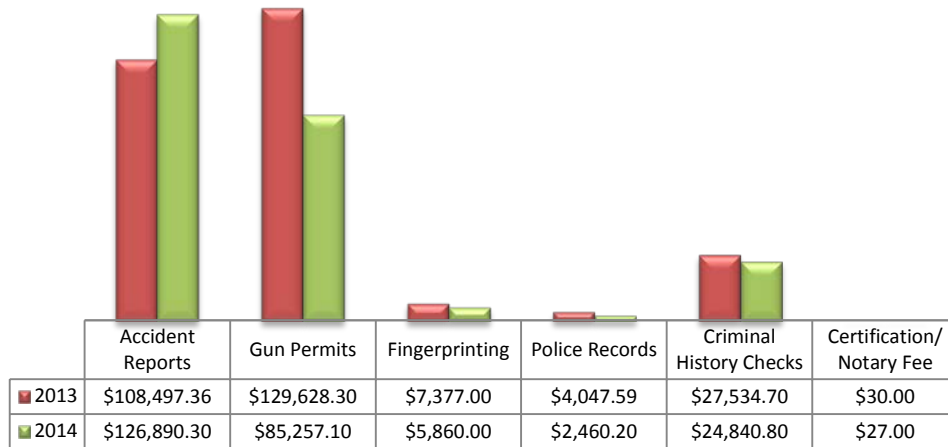

F.W.P.D.'S ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE REVAMPED GANG & VIOLENT CRIMES UNIT



The year 2013 marked the City's most violent year with regard to total number of homicides recorded. To address this increase, the Department revamped its Gang Unit by changing its name to the Gang and Violent Crimes Unit, and adding three times the number of officers formerly assigned, including a member of the Indiana State Police. This unit is specifically designed to address gang violence and violent crime. Those supporting this new initiation include the Allen County Sheriff's Department, the Drug Enforcement Agency, Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Marshals Service, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms, Allen County Prosecutor's Office, and the U.S. Attorney's Office.
